


## Curriculum Implementation

At Southwold School, we have devised an English curriculum which is sequenced progressively to develop the acquisition of knowledge and skills. English is taught both as a discrete subject and in a cross-curricular format. Reading is placed at the centre of our English curriculum to immerse and engage our pupils in a literature-rich environment through the use of high quality texts.

We ensure whole school consistency through the use of the three phase approach to teaching both reading and writing. Each term, at least one high quality text is used as a stimulus which links closely to our big question. From this, a fiction and a non-fiction piece of writing are produced using key skills including spelling, grammar and punctuation, which will be taught throughout the year.

Throughout the three phases of teaching, working walls are used as visual prompts to enable pupils to use prior and current learning in their independent writing. Pupils are taught editing and revising skills to enable them to become authors who are writing for a purpose and audience.

Early reading is taught via the phonics first approach. We use the Read Write Inc programme to support both Phonics and Spelling. Spellings are taught according to the rules and grammar and punctuation are taught within the 3-phase approach. Two skills are taught each week and pupils use these to create a piece of writing every week. The final outcome of each 3-week unit will showcase the pupils' ability to use and apply the skills independently.

Handwriting is taught as a discrete skill, we use the Nelson scheme and have high expectations of neatness and presentation in all written work. Pupils learn grammar, punctuation, vocabulary and spelling within the context of reading quality, challenging texts and taught skills.

We offer all children the opportunity to participate in all aspects of the English curriculum.
